- Why a Service Dog?
 - Hope (C); More personality than a cane (R)
- Agency
 - Paws with a Cause (C); Service Dog Project (R)
- Primary Daily Service
 - Balance, help with freezing (C); Balance (R)

About Us



Who, What, Where, Why, When & How Continued

- Time together
 - 2 years, 5 months (C); 1 year, 3 days (R)
- Wishes she knew before applying
 - How much I would love her (C);
 - More people with a service dog to ask questions, shadow for a day (R)

A: All the Good: Companionship

Service Dogs Can

- Lift mood, relieve depression
- Ease loneliness
- Be there
- Provide help without judgment
- Increase independence

of Living with a Service Dog

- A: All the Good: Mobility
- Service Dogs Can
 - Brace to lean on
 - Act as a cane for stability
 - Provide walking support and balance
 - Help with 'freezing'
 - Retrieve dropped or hard-to-reach items

A: All the Good: Social Bridge

Service Dogs Can Be a

- Conversation starter
- Way for people to approach
- Distraction from the handler's disability

B: By the Way



of Living with a Service Dog

- B: By the Way: Cost
- Many organization donate dogs but require fundraising
- Vet fees, food and general care become household budget items
- One-time expenses include bedding, harnesses, ID tags
- Will a larger car or van be needed?





of Living with a Service Dog

- B: By the Way: Schedule
- Factor time to harness, load, unload dog
- Plan extra time for airport security when traveling
- Remember the dog's feeding times and outdoor needs
- Be early to places that may have limited space





of Living with a Service Dog

B: By the Way: Responsibility

- General care, feeding, grooming, vet checks
- Up-to-date vaccines
- Training maintenance







of Living with a Service Dog

C: Caution



of Living with a Service Dog

- C: Caution: Not a Cure
 Service Dogs Cannot
 - Change the diagnosis
 - Replace meds
 - Prevent all falls (the dog, at least initially, can cause them!)
 - Relieve tremors or dyskinesia
 - Not be a dog





of Living with a Service Dog

C: Caution: Not Easy

Service Dogs Need:

- Care: Feeding, grooming, exercise, vet checks
- Training: The training doesn't end when the dog comes home
- Attention: Give affection & praise, allow for play time and family time
- Awareness: This is a working dog in public & at home



of Living with a Service Dog

C: Caution: Not for Everyone

A Service Dog may not be for you if you

- Have allergies
- Are unable to feed the dog or let the dog out
- Are uncomfortable with drool, fur, ear cleaning, waste pickup
- Don't want a shadow
- Are more a cat person
